## Helpful Facts about the Bible

- 1. The Bible is a collection of books. It has two major parts; the Old Testament and the New Testament. The word "testament" means agreement or promise.
- 2. This collection of books was written by about 40 men.
- 3. The books were written between 1500 BC and AD 96. By AD 175, the books were collected and by AD 397, the church approved them as the Word of God.
- 4. It has many styles of literature: poetry, drama, history, proverbs, personal letters and messages, and autobiography.
- 5. It is the story of a loving God seeking a relationship with people.
- 6. Christians believe that God used people to write His words. Throughout the centuries, people recognized these writings as special. They preserved them, read and studied them, and even died for them.
- 7. God's word helps us. Psalm119: 105 "Your word is like a lamp that shows me the way. It is like a light that guides me."

Wisdom- Proverbs and Ecclesiastes

The life of Jesus Christ- Matthew, Mark, Luke, John

God's love- John 3:16, I John 4:7-21

What looks interesting to you?

When you read the Bible, there are some important questions to keep in mind.

Who wrote the book, to whom was it written, and when?
What is the main thought from the section you read?
What questions does the passage bring to mind?
What does it say about people?
What does the passage teach about God?
Does the passage change your attitudes about God, yourself, or others? How so?

The following passage is from the book of Proverbs, chapter 3. Proverbs was written by Solomon, king of Israel, to his son. After you read it see how many of the previous questions you can answer.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart; do not depend on your own understanding.

Seek his will in all you do, and he will show you which path to take.

Don't be impressed with your own wisdom. Instead, fear the Lord and turn away from evil.
